Course Description

She/her/they: Misgendering and the Use of Gender Pronouns in the Courts

This session explores the question of "misgendering" by the use of incorrect gender pronouns to refer to an individual in the courtroom. It begins by identifying the relevant terms of art and the context of social practice. The session then explores the parameters set by legal codes of ethics, recent court cases, and professional expectations of cultural competency. The objectives of the session are to identify emerging issues of professionalism and anti-discrimination in the courts, while offering practical solutions for attorneys and judges.

Beyond Frozen Embryos: New Family Forms and New Challenges from ART

Alternative family relationships and alternative forms of reproduction are replacing the traditional ones, and possibly becoming the new norm. The modern family dynamic comes in a variety of configurations, including married and unmarried couples, individuals who decide to co-parent without engaging in an intimate relationship, and polyamorous families. These new family forms, together with new methods of family formation like in vitro fertilization, present a variety of novel legal issues that make resolving family disputes more complicated. This presentation will give an overview of some of those legal issues and discuss how they are addressed (if at all) in Ohio law.
